The Millennium School International Design Competition seeks to spur the design of disaster-resistant schools for developing countries that are prone to hurricanes, floods, earthquakes, and other maladies. The schools will serve a dual purpose as disaster-resistant shelters in times of severe need. Suzette was the principal architect and registered participant. Her firm placed among the top seven winners, with the highest ranking outside of firms from the Philippines and Malaysia, in the competition which attracted 300 inquiries. As a result, Suzette was invited to discuss its design at MIT during a seminar (sponsored by the Harvard Kennedy School of Government) on “Designing Schools for a Climate-Challenged World” sponsored by the MIT Special Program of Urban and Regional Studies and Planning on May 2, 2007. The seminar served as a platform to display the top twenty international entries in the Millennium Competition.
